Middle School

COURSE	DESCRIPTION	CREDITS
The Story of the Old Testament (7th) (BJU)	Guides students through the grand narrative of Scripture—Creation, Fall, Redemption—by studying key Old Testament events and figures. Students learn to observe, interpret, and apply biblical texts using a structured Bible study method. Emphasizes connections to the New Testament and personal spiritual growth through prayer journaling and Scripture memory.	N/A
The Life of Christ (8th) (BJU)	Focuses on the earthly ministry of Jesus Christ, including His miracles, parables, sermons, and interactions with people. Students explore the character of Christ and His fulfillment of Old Testament prophecy. Encourages reflection, personal application, and service through weekly memory verses and ministry hours.	N/A

COURSE	DESCRIPTION	CREDITS
Bible 100: The Triumph of Christ (BJU)	Guides students through a thematic study of the New Testament, focusing on the book of Acts, the Epistles, and Revelation. Students explore the growth of the early church, the doctrinal foundations of Christian living, and the ultimate victory of Christ. The course emphasizes spiritual maturity, biblical worldview development, and personal application. Activities include Scripture memory, prayer journaling, and interpretive exercises that help students observe, understand, and live out biblical truth.	1

COURSE	DESCRIPTION	CREDITS
Bible 200: Bible Doctrines (BJU)	Covers all major Bible doctrines and makes application to how Christians should live in the world today. Builds on the metanarrative of Scripture to teach key Bible doctrines, helping students come to know and love God by understanding what they believe and why they believe it. Students will summarize key doctrines, formulate doctrinal positions according to biblical teaching, and apply Bible doctrines to their personal walk with God.	1
Bible 300: Why the Bible Matters (BJU)	Explains the Bible's design and function; how the Bible relates to science, history, and literature; and why the Bible is vital in making decisions. Students explore the reliability and authority of Scripture and develop confidence in God's Word as the foundation for Christian living and worldview.	1
Bible 400: Ethics (BJU)	Helps students grow in virtue and think Christianly so that they can make wise ethical choices and defend the faith from a biblical worldview. Students compare and contrast various ethical systems, relate biblical wisdom to a variety of ethical situations, and defend biblical Christianity in a culture of competing truth claims and diverse lifestyles.	1
Missions	Equips students with biblical foundations for global outreach. Covers evangelism, cultural sensitivity, missionary biographies, and practical ministry skills. Class conducted in preparation for the El Salvador Missions trip. This class also includes the 11th-grade service trip within its framework.	0.5

MATHEMATICS

COURSE	DESCRIPTION	CREDITS
Arithmetic 6 (Abeka)	Reviews decimals, fractions, measures, and more while enhancing understanding of basic geometry, percentages, graphs, algebra, and practical mathematics. Develops problem-solving skills through analyzing and checking answers for accuracy. Supplemental problems, homework assignments, and a handbook for terms and definitions provide ample review and reinforcement of core concepts.	N/A
Intermediate Mathematics (Abeka)	Reviews concepts from previous years while introducing new ideas, bridging the gap between elementary and high school math. Covers arithmetic, geometry, statistics, and introductory algebra. Effectively prepares students for testing and for more advanced math courses. Features step-by-step examples, daily exercises, review exercises, and a glossary of terms.	N/A
Pre-Algebra (Abeka)	Builds a vital bridge between basic math and advanced concepts taught in high school. Teaches vital algebraic concepts including evaluating algebraic expressions, solving equations, identifying signed numbers, and finding rational and irrational numbers. Prepares students to succeed in Algebra 1.	N/A

COURSE	DESCRIPTION	CREDITS
Algebra 1 (Abeka)	Equips students to solve linear, absolute value, and quadratic equations, systems of equations, simplify rational expressions, and factor algebraic expressions. Real-life applications emphasize practical use of algebra in everyday life. Christian philosophy throughout the textbook emphasizes the orderly design of God as reflected in mathematical laws. Builds on concepts from Pre-Algebra for a smooth transition into higher mathematics.	1

COURSE	DESCRIPTION	CREDITS
Geometry (BJU)	Applies algebraic skills to geometric figures. Topics include proofs, logic, angles, triangles, circles, and coordinate geometry. Students learn to reason deductively and apply biblical principles of order and design.	1
Algebra 2 (Abeka)	Reinforces foundational algebraic methods while expanding into probability, statistics, and transitional graphing. Introduces new topics including sequences, series, counting, and trigonometry. Mastery of concepts is developed through detailed examples and ample practice problems.	1
Pre-Calculus	Prepares students for calculus with advanced algebra, trigonometry, analytic geometry, and introductory limits. Emphasizes mathematical modeling and God’s consistency in creation.	1
Consumer Math (BJU)	Focuses on real-life financial literacy: budgeting, banking, credit, taxes, insurance, and investments. Students develop a biblical philosophy of stewardship and personal finance.	1

COURSE	DESCRIPTION	CREDITS
6th Grade Science	An introduction to life, earth, and physical science using the BJU Press curriculum. Students explore God’s creation through topics including cells, ecosystems, weather, geology, matter, and energy. Emphasizes scientific inquiry and a biblical worldview of creation.	N/A
7th Science (Life Science)	Introduces students to microbiology, botany, zoology, human anatomy, and ecology. Emphasizes the image of God in man and stewardship of creation through a biblical worldview.	N/A
8th Science (Earth Science)	Covers geology, meteorology, oceanography, and astronomy. Students explore Earth’s systems and history while evaluating scientific models through the lens of Scripture.	N/A

Physical Science	Combines introductory chemistry and physics. Topics include matter, energy, motion, forces, and atomic structure. Encourages ethical scientific inquiry grounded in biblical truth.	1
Biology	Examines living organisms, cell biology, genetics, taxonomy, and ecosystems. Reinforces the sanctity of life and God’s design in biological systems. Includes lab-based investigations.	1
Chemistry	Explores atomic theory, chemical bonding, reactions, stoichiometry, thermodynamics, and gas laws. Highlights the order and predictability of God’s creation through chemical principles.	1
Physics NEW	Studies mechanics, energy, waves, electricity, magnetism, and optics. Students explore the fundamental laws governing the physical universe while examining the consistency and intelligibility of God’s created order. Includes laboratory investigations and mathematical problem-solving.	1

<p>Flood Geology</p>	<p>Investigates geological evidence from a young-earth creationist perspective. Topics include sedimentary layers, fossil records, and the global impact of the Genesis Flood. Encourages discernment in evaluating secular models.</p>	<p>0.5</p>
<p>Intro to Forensic Science</p>	<p>Designed for grades 11–12, this lab-based course introduces students to over twenty scientific disciplines used in criminal investigations. Topics include evidence analysis, crime scene reconstruction, blood spatter patterns, shoeprint casting, fire forensics, and toxicology. Students engage with real case studies while learning to apply observational techniques and scientific reasoning. Woven throughout is a strong biblical worldview, emphasizing God as the Author of science and the importance of truth, justice, and discernment.</p>	<p>1</p>

COURSE	DESCRIPTION	CREDITS
6th Language Arts	An integrated language arts course using the BJU Press curriculum that combines writing and grammar, literature, and spelling. Students develop foundational writing skills, study grammar and composition, explore age-appropriate literature, and build vocabulary and spelling proficiency. Instruction emphasizes clear expression and a biblical worldview of language and communication.	N/A
7th Language Arts	Using the Memoria Press classical curriculum, students develop foundational skills in grammar, composition, and rhetoric. Instruction emphasizes sentence diagramming, precise usage, and structured paragraph writing rooted in the classical tradition. Students build habits of clear, orderly expression grounded in biblical principles of truth and communication.	N/A
Classic Literature (7th) NEW	Part of the Memoria Press classical literature sequence, this course introduces students to enduring works that have shaped Western thought and imagination. Through guided literary analysis, students engage with age-appropriate classics, developing skills in close reading, moral reasoning, and biblical discernment. Emphasis is placed on reading carefully, thinking deeply, and connecting great stories to the grand narrative of Scripture.	N/A
8th Language Arts	Continuing the Memoria Press grammar and composition sequence, students refine their command of English grammar, sentence variety, and essay structure. Instruction builds toward more sophisticated composition skills including research writing, persuasive argumentation, and literary response—all within a classical framework and biblical worldview. Classic Literature (8th) <small>NEW</small>	Advances the Memoria Press classical literature sequence with more complex works of fiction, poetry, and nonfiction from the Western literary tradition. Encourages thoughtful interaction between great literature and a biblical worldview.	N/A

9th English	Following the Memoria Press classical curriculum, this course pairs systematic grammar and composition instruction with the study of foundational literature. Students explore plot, character, theme, and literary form while developing structured writing across genres. The classical approach cultivates careful reading, logical thinking, and eloquent expression.	1
10th English	Continues the Memoria Press sequence with deeper literary interpretation and more advanced composition. Students engage with classic texts from the Western canon, develop persuasive and analytical writing skills, and evaluate literature through the lens of a biblical worldview. Emphasis on rhetoric and argumentation prepares students for upper-level coursework.	1
11th English (American Literature)	Using Memoria Press resources, this course surveys key works of American literature from the colonial era to the modern period. Students analyze historical context, literary movements, and author worldview while refining analytical essays and research writing. The classical approach emphasizes primary source engagement and integration of literature with history and theology.	1
12th English (British Literature)	The capstone of the Memoria Press English sequence, this course explores major works of British literature from the Anglo-Saxon period to the contemporary era. Emphasizes literary heritage, worldview comparison, and advanced writing techniques including literary criticism, synthesis, and senior thesis preparation. Students complete their classical education with a mature command of language and letters.	1

Spanish 2	Builds on Spanish 1 with intermediate-level grammar and vocabulary. Students learn to communicate in real-life scenarios—restaurants, banks, airports, schools—while mastering reflexive verbs, object pronouns, and past tenses. Scripture passages and cultural immersion deepen both language skills and gospel fluency.	1
Spanish 3	Deepens students' mastery of Spanish grammar, vocabulary, and oral communication. Features true stories, letters, and personal accounts from missionaries in Spanish-speaking countries. Emphasizes advanced verb forms (including subjunctive), longer translations, and gospel-centered outreach preparation.	1
Spanish IV	Brings students to an advanced level of Spanish proficiency through complex composition, literary analysis, and sophisticated oral discourse. Students engage with Spanish-language literature, theological texts, and authentic media to sharpen critical thinking and cross-cultural communication. Emphasizes nuanced grammar, idiomatic expression, and advanced writing skills. Prepares students for college-level Spanish and equips them for gospel ministry in Spanish-speaking communities.	1

AP Biology	Grades 11–12 2 Semesters / 1 Credit. Recommendations: Biology A- or better, Chemistry B+ or better, Algebra 2 complete; Physics. Investigates creation through a scientific lens; covers evolution, natural selection, genetics, human behavior, molecular biology, and biochemical reactions. Includes study of energy strategies, heritability, and cellular communication. Rigorous pace with required laboratory work.	1
Honors Algebra 2/Trigonometry	Grades 9–10 2 Semesters / 1 Credit. Recommendations: A- (90) in Honors Algebra 1; Honors Geometry B+ (88) or higher; TI-83 or TI-84 calculator required. Emphasis on grammar, composition, theme writing, essay testing, research paper, and College Preparatory vocabulary.	1
